Most university employees* including graduate assistants, teaching assistants, and residence assistants are required to report instances of sexual misconduct to the Title IX coordinator.

When do I report?

- · If you witness any sexual misconduct in the workplace
- If you hear directly from someone who has experienced sexual misconduct
- If someone tells you about sexual misconduct happening to a student or colleague

Why is it mandatory to report?

- To ensure the individual has access to all available resources and support
- To ensure the individual understands their rights and reporting options
- To enhance campus safety
- · To comply with Title IX and Louisiana state law

What is sexual misconduct?

- · Discrimination based on sex
- · Sexual harassment
- · Dating and domestic interpersonal violence
- · Sexual assault
- Stalking and retaliation

What is power-based trauma?

Any form of violence intended to control or intimidate another person by asserting power over the person. Any type of sexual misconduct is power-based violence.

What do I do if someone discloses sexual misconduct?

1. Listen and provide support

Listen empathetically without judgment. As early as possible, let them know you are a mandatory reporter; if they would prefer it, offer them an opportunity to instead talk to a confidential supporter/resource.

2. Refer to supportive resources, such as:

4. What happens after I report?

- The Office of Civil Rights & Title IX contacts the person who experienced or disclosed the incident and offers to meet.
- Staff treat all disclosed information seriously and with sensitivity and compassion. The person is informed about confidential resources on and off campus.
- Title IX staff provide information and options.
 Supportive interim measures and accommodations are reviewed.
- Title IX staff help the person understand their next steps based on their unique circumstances. This may include filing a formal complaint with the university, reporting to law enforcement, or taking no action.
